## Lawyers And Doctors Join Forces To Combat Drug And Alcohol Abuse Among Young

At a press conference Elliott C. Winograd, Chairman of the Medical/Legal Committee of The Nassau County Bar Association and Mark J. Cappola, Executive Director of The Nassau County Medical Society announced that the Nassau County Bar Association and the Nassau County Medical Society have joined forces to confront the nation's devastating drug and alcohol problem, and its alarming expansion to adolescents and children. "We have merged our skills and experiences in Lawyer/Doctor Education Teams to teach our young people about the dangers of drug and alcohol abuse," said Winograd.

The public schools should be aware of the fact that the nation has two percent of the world's population. But as the decade of the 1990s begins, that population is consuming more than half of the world's supply of illicit drugs. Sixty-six million Americans have tried drugs; nearly 40 percent of them used an illegal drug in the past year; sixty-five percent of new employees entering the work place have used illegal drugs. The cost to the people in the nation is more than 100 billion dollars each year in lost productivity, crime and health care, let alone the cost to the individual user or abuser. "What is more wrenching is that nationwide more than 375

thousand babies are born drug-or alcoholexposed *in utero* each year—more than one thousand babies everyday. Most are wards of the state. Unfortunately there are additional upsetting facts;" noted Winograd who explained that alcohol related car crashes are the leading cause of death for 15-to-19 year olds, with an estimated 8,000 young people dying and 40,000 injured each year; every day, 437 young people are arrested for drinking and drunken driving; every day 211 children are arrested for drug abuse in the United States. Further, almost half of all adolescent suicides are related to the use of alcohol or other drugs.

#### What Has Gone Wrong

Decades of effort have failed to reverse the tide of drug and alcohol abuse. Legal, medical and educational systems are strained to the breaking point in dealing with the consequences. Providing information is apparently not enough. It is contended that most substance-abusing people lack a fundamental social bond—a sense of purpose, a sense of belonging, and the social supportnecessary to become healthy, responsible and well adjusted adults.

#### What Can Be Done

Experience has shown that the most effective strategy to prevent drug and alcohol

abuse is a comprehensive, community-wide approach. It has been successful in other health promotion campaigns, and experts believe its lessons can be applied to adolescent drug and alcohol abuse. Prevention efforts target the roots of a social problem. They call upon all of society to work together to send correct and consistent messages to young people, and to provide support systems that help them develop normally, and lead productive, satisfying lives.

#### Role Of Lawyers And Physicians

The legal and medical professions are uniquely equipped to deal with the complex interplay of personal, social and environmental factors in adolescent drug and alcohol abuse. They are ideally matched to carry out the six tasks of effective prevention, to wit: effecting policy; encouraging the involvement of influential community members; providing authoritative and practical information; promoting a healthy lifestyle; strengthening social competencies and peer resistance skills; and acting as postive role models.

The joint legal/medical program proposal would be to present a program in schools

lasting 30-45 minutes (or one-hour class period) and to give to students practical, upto-date, and reliable information on the health dangers and legal risks of drug and alcohol abuse and to answer their questions; to encourage them in their efforts to keep themselves and other young people out of trouble; and to listen to their views and concerns about the problem of drug and alcohol abuse in your community.

In the first of a series of presentations in local schools, The Nassau County Medical Society and the Nassau County Bar Association teamed up last week to give students at South Side High School a double dose of the dangers of drug and alcohol abuse.

"One out of ten people in this room will suffer from alcoholism in 25 to 30 years," Dr. Patrick Carone, a Rockville Centre psychiatrist told the more than 300 students. "In addition, 12 percent of you will be married to an alcoholic." As for crack, he said, "It increases blood pressure and can cause a stroke that will blow away part of your brain."

Elliot Winograd, an attorney who lives

in Rockville Centre, was equally blunt.
"Carrying a fake ID to buy liquor is a
felony that could get you five years...and
35 percent of all prisoners are assaulted
in one way or another." Mr. Winograd
also listed the penalties for buying and
selling illegal substances, which range
all the way from six months to 15 years.
"And remember," he cautioned, "Nassau
County is not lenient on alcohol and
controlled substance abuse."

Following the presentation, the students, grades 9-12, were encouraged to join in the discussion and ask questions in this first Doctor/Lawyer Education Team series.

#### McGrath Denounces Senate Attempt to Increase Air Traffic in New York Area

Congressman Ray McGrath said this week that a Senate provision in the forthcoming budget bill would eliminate the current limit on takeoffs and landings at John F. Kennedy International Airport and LaGuardia Airport. If the provision remains, aircraft noise in surrounding communities could increase dramatically.

"This is a diabolical attempt by one Senator to ruin all of the aircraft noise reduction efforts of the last decade," the Congressman stated. "More aircraft in the already crowded Northeast corridor could also cause significant safety problems."

A last-minute amendment by Senator John McCain would eliminate the high density rule which restricts the number of takeoffs and landings per hour at the nation's busiest airports. In addition to Kennedy and LaGuardia Airports, Chicago's O'Hare International was also included. By allowing more flights to these airports, Congressman McGrath charged, Senator McCain is trying to create an eastern market for Arizona-based America West airline.

## Doctor-Lawyer Team To Fight Drug Abuse

In a first-of-a-kind presentation for Long Island schools, a doctor and lawyer will join forces on Friday, October 12, at 9:30 a.m. in South Side High School to give kids a double dose why they should stay clear of drugs. "The fact is that if it doesn't kill you, it will do worse - it will fry your brain," says Dr. Patrick Carone. The Rockville Centre psychiatrist will speak along with attorney Elliott Winograd also of Rockville Centre, as the Nassau County Medical Society and the Nassau County Bar Association confront the nation's devastating drug and alcohol problem. "My remarks will scare the wits out of these kids," says Mr. Winograd. "I'm going to tell them, especially the guys, what really happens to you in jail."
